SUCCESS STORIES FROM A VITAL PROGRAM

Victoria is experiencing an affordable housing crisis. Numerous factors combine to create the current local situation where rental housing is in short supply, and out of price for many. Estimates place the number of people experiencing homelessness in the Capital Region at 1,500 with rental vacancy rates as low as 1% and housing prices rising year over year.

The impact on VWTH service users can be significant. Women leaving an abusive relationship may have additional barriers to securing housing. These challenges can include:

- · Loss of partner's income
- Inability to work
- Reliance on Income Assistance
- Shortage of affordable options
- · Forced to seek market rental housing

This is where the VWTH Housing **Support Program and Homelessness Prevention Program** can make a real difference in a woman's life. With oneto-one support, quidance, resources and trauma-informed outreach



services, the VWTH HPP workers help find solutions to prevent women leaving abusive relationships from becoming homeless, or returning to the relationship because they have nowhere to live. In addition, short-term rent funding support, determined on a client-by-client basis, is available to remove the financial barrier to housing. Funding support can be applied to a woman's rent, deposit, moving or storage costs, utilities etc. This is temporary short-term assistance, on average 3-6 months, and is combined with regular client follow-up for a full 12 months.


Our Mission

Client Success Story

Abbey – navigating school, an expensive-rental market and moving forward

"Abbey" left her abusive partner and stayed at our Shelter before finding her own rental housing. Throughout the difficult transition period, she managed to maintain her full-time studies, as well as part-time employment, but needed short-term rent funding support from our Homelessness Prevention Program (HPP) to cover her basic monthly expenses. Along with the five-month funding support, HPP staff also helped her apply for an educational grant, to ensure she could pay her school fees in the coming term. During the summer, Abbey was able to work two jobs and put some money aside for the current school year. She is now back at school, continuing to work part-time, and looking ahead to the next steps in her educational and career paths.







Positive Progress on Second Stage Housing

PUBLIC ANNOUNCEMENT OF NEW WESTSHORE PROJECT

On November 4th Victoria Women's Transition House and community partners were proud to take part in a special announcement regarding the ground breaking for the new Westshore Transition Housing project. In attendance were Premier John Horgan, MLAs Mitzi Dean and Grace Lore as well as outgoing Mayor of Langford Stew Young.

VWTH partnered with BC Housing to announce this exciting project. The new four-storey building will include a mix of studio, one-, two-, three-bedroom spaces that will serve as affordable housing for women and those who identify as women, and their dependent children, leaving violence. The site will offer two short-term safe home spaces and 48 second-stage homes that will provide accommodation with on-site supports for women and those who identify as women, and their dependent children, leaving violence. The second-stage housing will offer some units for a moderate length stay (up to one year) and others for longer stays (up to two years).

Makenna Rielly, VWTH Executive Director spoke at the event: "We believe that violence and abuse have no place in the family or in society. Thank you to BC Housing for providing this complex to keep women and children safe within the community and to the donors for supporting our programs."



BACKGROUND

On any given day in our community, hundreds of women and their children are living with abuse at home. The requests for services in the Westshore communities have increased with the rapid growth in the area, which has few intimate partner violence services to offer.

In October of 2018, Premier John Horgan officially announced that BC Housing intended to build second stage housing in Langford. The Province, through BC Housing, purchased the land and will provide the Victoria Women's Transition House Society (VWTHS) with an annual operating subsidy.

Women in intimate partner violence situations may attempt to leave an abusive relationship multiple times; and one of the most common reasons they return to that abusive relationship is the fear of homelessness. What VWTH can offer at this new Westshore location are value added services by providing a one-stop service delivery program. In this complex there will be

- Short-term second stage affordable housing up to one year (higher levels of service)
- Second stage affordable housing up to two years for those involved in the programming
- Counselling and groups for women and children
- · Children's programs
- Community partner meeting rooms
- Workshop space for VWTH classes such as Rent Smart, Financial Literacy, Expressive Arts and Life Skills support
- Gathering space for Indigenous women and children to meet with families, elders and other community supports.

We anticipate that the project will be complete to welcome guests by the fall 2024. As with all projects for women and children leaving violence, the address of this project has not been disclosed for safety reasons.





UNDERSTANDING THE CHALLENGES OF LEAVING

Studies show that 67% of Canadians know a woman who has been the victim of intimate partner violence. Too often, people assume that abuse will end by leaving and that if a woman stays with an abusive partner she is making a choice to stay.

Victoria Women's Transition House understands that women face often overwhelming challenges in leaving, and that her reasons for staying are numerous and valid.

She may stay because she...

- doesn't know the supports available in her community;
- · believes she has nowhere to go;
- fears for her life and the lives of her children because he has threatened harm if she leaves;
- could be facing homelessness if she leaves:
- doesn't want her children growing up in poverty or without a father;
- blames herself and has been told the abuse is her fault.

To help overcome the obstacles facing women who are seeking both safety and lives free from intimate partner violence, VWTH offers specialised support and services. As well as the Emergency Shelter accommodation and 24-hr Crisis and Information Line we have developed programs to address, and work to eliminate, any barriers to women and their children seeking safety.

Substance Use and Intimate Partner Violence

COMPLICATED RELATIONSHIP REQUIRES SKILLED SUPPORT

VWTH Stopping the Violence (STV) counsellors see the complicated relationship between intimate partner violence (IPV) and substance use. They understand that VWTH clients may have fear in disclosing their substance use, of being judged, and that their substance use will affect custody of their children. Alongside this fear is shame.

For many survivors of intimate partner violence, using drugs and alcohol are a way to cope with the traumatic effects of abuse. Others may be coerced into using by an abusive partner who then sabotages their efforts toward recovery and threatens to disclose the substance use to the authorities (e.g., the police, treatment providers, the courts).



Having recognized the need for additional support for women in our counselling services who have substance use issues, VWTH is thankful for recent funding that has made it possible to add an additional full-time STV counsellor.

As well, funding has allowed all staff to complete enhanced training around substance use as it relates to IPV, safe naloxone administration protocols and expanded information and resources for clients with a harm reduction approach.

Karlee Grant, Senior Programs Manager, says "I'm feeling very optimistic that we're able to provide support and service to a portion of the population that has intersecting problems – we're addressing the stigma attached to IPV and to substance use. By reducing the shame attached we hope that more women will feel safe to disclose their challenges and that more individuals who need them will seek our services."
